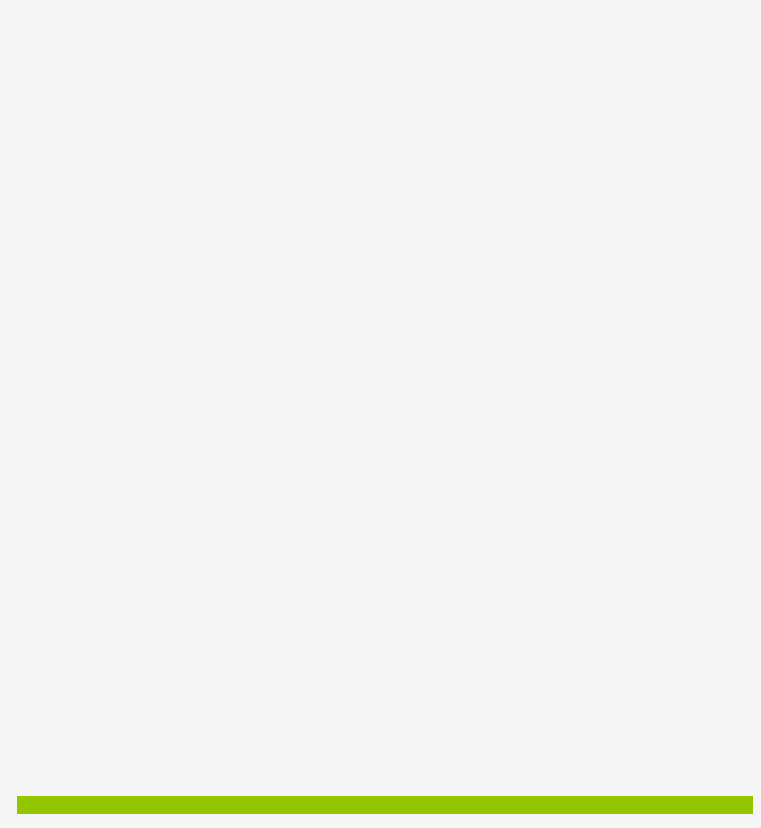

Residential Life

- 396 students live on campus
- Housing Requirements - all full-time freshman and sophomore day campus students must live on campus, except:
 - Married students
 - Single-parent students
 - Students residing with parents in Boone County, MO
 - Students age 22 or older
 - Military veterans as defined by federal guideline



Students who live on campus make life-long friends, get more involved in campus clubs, and have better access to campus resources!

The Residence Halls

Miller Hall is co-ed, with suite style bathrooms. It is home to many upperclassmen.



Hughes Hall is all female, with suite style bathrooms. This hall fills up quickly, mostly with upper-classwomen.

Banks Hall is coed, with six community bathrooms. A great place for an incoming student to be!



The Residence Halls



Cougar Village is our college apartment complex. They are 3 and 4 bedroom apartments with full kitchens, with 4 students in each apartment. It costs an additional \$250 per semester.

Hughes Haven is located in the lower level of Hughes Hall and is only open to women. Each room has one bedroom and one living room, and 2 students live in each mini-apartment. It costs an additional \$100 per semester.



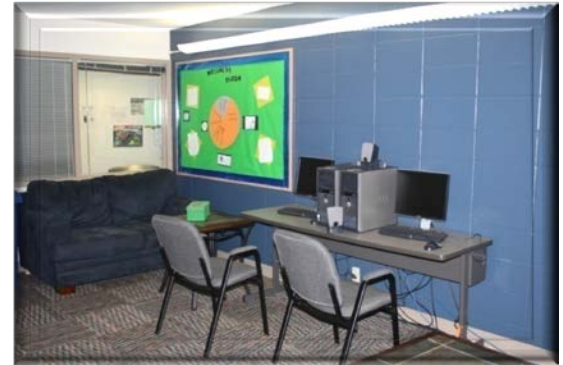
Selection for Cougar Village and Hughes Haven is based on credit hours completed and good standing at the college.

Residence Hall Amenities

- Our residence halls have a lot to offer!

Facilities include:

- Free laundry facilities
- Computer labs
- Cable tv access in each room
- Telephone with voice mail in each room
- Study lounges
- Kitchenettes
- Internet access in each room
- Residence hall cinema



Life in the Halls

- The halls are locked 24 hours a day. You use your ID card to gain access to your hall.



- You can choose between two meal plans: 14 meals per week and 20 meals per week.

- The halls are supervised by two professional live-on staff members, called ACs, as well as several student advisors, called RAs, who help with roommate problems and plan lots of fun programs within the halls.



- New student housing assignments are based on the receipt date of the housing contract.
- Students who live on campus can bring cars to campus.

Other Student Affairs Services

- **Student Health** : a nurse practitioner provides medical services at minimal or no cost.
- **Counseling Services**: Licensed, professional counselors provide counseling to students at no charge. Services are confidential.



- **Disability Services**: If you have a documented disability, let our Disability Services Coordinator assist you.
- **International Programs**: provides assistance with immigration regulations, visas and more.

Career Services

- Administers career assessment tests
- Assistance locating internships, part-time or full-time jobs, and applying for graduate school
- Offers workshops in resume writing, interviewing skills and the job search process



- Offers other activities including an Etiquette Dinner, Career Fair, Junior/Senior grad fair, and mock interviews conducted by alumni
- Respondents to our 2009 graduate survey indicated 81% of our graduates were employed full time.

Student Support Services

- A grant funded program that helps eligible students with extra tutoring, support programming, advising and more.
- Located in the Columbia House on 10th Street



Crisis Response Plan

- The entire campus community is educated about our crisis response plan
- State-of-the-art PurpleTree emergency alert system in place in classrooms, residence halls and throughout campus
- Phone intercom system alerts campus community of any emergency situation
- E-mails are sent to students to alert them of emergency situations in the area
